INTRODUCTION FROM ECO DRAMA'S ARTISTIC DIRECTOR, EMILY REID

We are delighted to share our latest report, charting Eco Drama's work over the last two years 2021-23.

Despite many challenges of an ongoing pandemic, we were grateful to begin 2021 with record interest in our **Out to Play** project. Since 2015, the project has been gathering steady momentum, and in early 2021, the launch of our latest resource pack for Early Years attracted the attention of **Glasgow City Council**, catapulting the work into all 236 nurseries across Glasgow and complimenting and enhancing our existing **Glasgow Communities Fund** project.

A 2-year long commission from the Council, along with growing interest from Primary Schools across Glasgow, paved the way for our busiest two years since the project began. Notably, schools began requesting Out to Play residencies in the winter term, certainly a first for the project, demonstrating potentially changed attitudes to outdoor learning since the pandemic.

As well as working with pupils, teachers and early years practitioners on the Out to Play project, advancing outdoor learning and learning for sustainability through the arts, we have been developing **new outdoor performance projects** which inspire and nurture children's connection to nature.

2021 saw a collaboration with writer Zoe Bullock, creating a new piece of outdoor performance for the Edinburgh International Childrens Festival '**The Listening Tree'**, and in 2022 we undertook a special commission with Lyth Arts Centre and Dandelion delivering '**Harvest Stories'** at various Harvest Festivals across Scotland.

We were delighted to have our film 'Future Calling' showcased as part of the programme of activities at COP26, and we continue to share knowledge and ideas via presentations, workshops and webinars with a variety of organisations and partners across Scotland, the UK and internationally.

We are proud to have achieved some of the headline statistics you can see on this page, and we hope you enjoy reading about our recent work in this report.

15 five-week Out to Play residencies took place across 11 primary schools engaging 2,146 learners and 263 teachers.

1,619 children and 1,107 early years practitioners participated in Out to Play Mini-Residencies and Out to Play In a Day.

831 teachers, early years practitioners and educators participated in 17 online and 5 in-person Out to Play CPD sessions.

We distributed 1,681 Out to Play resource packs as part of Out to Play projects, and through sales.

We presented on Out to Play at conferences and events, including Education Scotland's Creativity and Wellbeing week.

OUT TO PLAY



Out to Play is Eco Drama's award-winning creative outdoor learning programme in which Drama Artists collaborate with partner primary schools, early years settings and additional support needs (ASN) schools to explore and promote the role of drama, storytelling and creativity in outdoor learning and play.

The strong CPD element underpinning the Out to Play programme develops staff knowledge, confidence and skills, empowering teachers and practitioners to deliver their own arts-based outdoor learning and play sessions.

Since 2015, Out to Play has worked in-depth with 64 schools and nurseries in the Greater Glasgow area, and reached over 7,500 children and 2,400 teachers and early years practitioners across Scotland, the UK and internationally.

Out to Play - Primary School Programme

In 2021-23, Eco Drama delivered 15 five-week Out to Play residencies across 11 schools. We also facilitated external CPD. In total, the primary programme engaged **2,146 learners** and 263 teachers in the broad subject area of Learning for Sustainability, aiming to nurture pupils' confidence, creativity, and health and wellbeing, as well as developing literacy, social skills and a deeper connection to the natural world.

Out to Play Early Years - Glasgow City Council Commission

In 2021-23, we were delighted to receive funding from Glasgow City Council to develop and deliver the Early Years strand of Out to Play. All of the Council's 236 nurseries participated in Early Years webinar training, and received copies of our 'Let's Go...Out to Play!' Early Years Resource Pack. A further 61 nurseries benefitted from our in-person CPD experiences 'Out to Play In a Day' and 'Mini-Residencies', in total engaging 1,619 children and 1,107 practitioners.









Out to Play aims to achieve the following outcomes:

- √ Children and young people have access to higher quality outdoor learning and play activities.
- √ Children and young people have improved knowledge, understanding and enthusiasm for nature.
- $\sqrt{\text{Create positive change in the lives of children and young}}$ people by improving academic attainment in relation to their Learning for Sustainability.
- $\sqrt{\text{Teachers}}$ and practitioners have improved knowledge, confidence and skills in delivering arts-based outdoor learning and play.

OUT TO PLAY PRIMARY RESIDENCIES



To assess levels of enjoyment and learning from the Out to Play residencies, we undertook a pre-post study inviting pupils and teachers to participate in evaluation before and after their Out to Play residency. Questions were designed to gather both qualitative and quantitative feedback.

To assess our feedback, we have used the Museums, Libraries and Archives Council's 'Inspiring Learning' framework. This identifies five General Learning Outcomes (GLOs) that we have used to measure outcomes and demonstrate the impact that participation in an Out to Play residency has had on pupils and staff.



KNOWLEDGE & UNDERSTANDING

Knowledge and Understanding was developed by increasing pupils' awareness of nature and their relationship to it. Curriculum areas covered included Social Studies, Literacy and English, Expressive Arts and Health and Wellbeing. Topics included plants and animals, food growing and food waste, seasons, life and water cycles, biodiversity, weather, reusing and recycling, ecosystems and climate change.

OUT TO PLAY PRIMARY RESIDENCIES



BEHAVIOUR & PROGRESSION

Weekly sessions during the five-week residencies encouraged pupils to spend time outdoors and enabled them to become familiar with the Out to Play methodology and engage deeply with its content. Participants developed more pro-environmental thoughts and behaviours, and changed or developed attitudes towards the natural world.



Participation in drama and storytelling games and activities encouraged pupils to be creative throughout the Out to Play sessions. Participants showed a high level of enjoyment from taking part in Out to Play across the two years.

ATTITUDES & VALUES

Drama and storytelling supported and encouraged participants to explore their attitudes and values towards nature and the environment — children gained a deeper awareness of the natural world, their place within it and our collective responsibility to care for it through the project.

OUT TO PLAY IN A DAY


10 Glasgow-based early years settings participated in a pilot of 'Out to Play In a Day' in 2021. As a result of its success, a further 27 nurseries were offered the opportunity to participate in Out to Play In a Day in 2021-23.

All settings spent one full day with a professional Drama Artist from Eco Drama. The Drama Artist facilitated arts-based, outdoor drama and storytelling sessions on the theme of water with three or four groups of each nursery's pre-school children. The day also included a CPD session for staff.



OUT TO PLAY EARLY YEARS

MINI-RESIDENCIES

In 2021-23, our Out to Play Mini-Residencies offered Early Years practitioners at **24 Glasgow-based nurseries** the chance to explore the Out to Play methodology in-depth.

Participating settings spent three full days with a Drama Artist from Eco Drama over three weeks. **589 children and 93 staff participated in outdoor drama and storytelling sessions.** In week one of the Mini-Residency, staff took part in a practical CPD workshop. In week two, a planning CPD session gave staff dedicated time to develop their own arts-based outdoor learning sessions, for delivery in week three.

Staff-led Out to Play sessions showed a **rich understanding** and enthusiasm for utilising storytelling and drama to deliver outdoor sessions themed around nature.



Practitioners felt that the most beneficial elements of the Out to Play Mini-Residencies were:

Saffron working in our setting & seeing our outdoor space used in a more creative way.


OUT TO PLAY CPD




In 2021-23, 831 teachers, practitioners and support staff participated in 17 online and five in-person Out to Play CPD sessions. During the 2-hour sessions, participants explored how to integrate arts-based outdoor learning and play into the curriculum, how to reimagine playgrounds to make them places of adventurous learning, and how to utilise creative learning methods such as drama and storytelling to engage learners with the natural world.



COP26




We were delighted to be able to take part in the programme of activities that marked Glasgow as host city for COP26.

Our short film <u>'Future Calling'</u> - created by pupils from Boclair Academy during lockdown 2020 - was included in the Educational Institute of Scotland's <u>'No Planet B'</u> digital exhibition and National Theatre of Scotland's <u>'Dear Planet'</u> Exhibition.

Eco Drama's Emily Reid and Ben Mali spoke at <u>'Campference'</u> - an online international conference about children, nature connection and the power of stories.

Emily was also a guest speaker at Starcatchers' COP26 Playspace event 'Sustainable and Climate Sensitive Practice in Arts for Early Years'. Starcatchers invited Emily to take over their Instagram account for a day to share stories on Eco Drama's sustainable and climate-friendly practices with the early years sector.

We shared learning from the Out to Play project when we delivered sessions at Learning through Landscapes' 'International School Grounds Conference' in February 2022, at Royal Society of Edinburgh's 'Early Years Being & Belonging Conference' in March 2022 and at Education Scotland's 'National Creativity Event' in April 2022. We also led an 'Intro to Ecoscenography' session in collaboration with set designer Mona Kastell for Starcatchers' Playspace in March 2023.

We have continued to add regular <u>Drama Artist</u> <u>blogs</u> to our website, sharing ideas and tips from the Out to Play residencies to support teachers and early years practitioners to develop their arts-based outdoor learning practices.

Our 3 Out to Play resource packs continue to attract interest from teachers, early years practitioners and educators. In 2021-23 we gave out **1,570** copies as part of Out to Play sessions, and sold a further **131** copies across Scotland, the UK and internationally.

CONCLUSION & REFLECTION

Over the last two years, we have witnessed many benefits of our creative outdoor learning and performance work.

Drama Artists and Performers witness the impact first-hand when interacting with participants and our core team gain insight via the evaluation data, from developments in children's creativity, imagination and confidence, to improved health and well-being, literacy, emotional and social development as well as skills, knowledge and understanding. We have also noted the development of nature connection and proenvironmental thoughts and behaviours.

Our projects demonstrate the unique ability of the arts to engage children emotionally as well as intellectually in their learning, and when children are connected emotionally, it is more impactful in the long run. Children appear to thrive in their learning when it happens outdoors, with many comments from pupils and staff about increased focus and well-being when learning and playing outdoors, particularly in pupils who may not engage in more formal teaching methods indoors.

It has also been encouraging to witness teachers and early years practitioners using drama and storytelling within their outdoor learning practice after taking part in Out to Play, ensuring a lasting legacy of the project.



However, despite making headway with a record number of schools and achieving positive evaluation data during Out to Play 2021-23, there is still more to be done.

A recent NatureScot Research Report published in 2022 evidenced that Outdoor Learning and Play provision has risen in early years settings, but has decreased significantly in primary schools, particularly in large schools and in areas of disadvantage. As we look to the next two-year period at Eco Drama, we feel a renewed sense of purpose to continue the momentum of Out to Play - to continue supporting the improvement of young people's health, wellbeing, learning for sustainability and educational outcomes, and Scotland's target to become a nature positive, net-zero country.
